In health care facilities and outreach programs across the nation, Catholics are offering their hands and hearts to persons living with AIDS. From a home for HIV-positive mothers in Los Angeles to a support group in New York, Living with AIDS introduces us to some of these people: a teen group that uses dramatizations to educate peers about AIDS prevention; parishioners who do household chores for neighbors living with AIDS; a hemophiliac, who lost his wife and most of his family to AIDS; and members of a South Dakota parish dealing with the denial and discrimination surrounding the death of a friend by AIDS.
